Size of Uganda

Relatively Very small Country,

- ☐ Surface area of 236,040 Km²;
- □ Land 199,710 Km² (84.6%)
- □ Water 36,330 Km² (15.4%)



Location

- **□** Land-Locked Country
- ☐ Located deep in the Great Lakes Region of Africa
- ☐ With 2,698 Km of International Boundary, shared as immediate neighbor, with
 - **DRC** on the West; 765Km (28.35%)
 - Kenya on the East; 933Km (34.58%)
 - Rwanda on the South West; 169Km, (6.26%)
 - Sudan on the North; 435Km and (16.13%)
 - Tanzania in the South; 396Km. (14.68%)

Relative Topography

- ☐ Unique panorama of a plateau that towers over the Africa Continent.
- **☐ Wider Altitudinal Variations; accounting for:**
 - ➤ Wider Climatic Conditions in time and space.
 - Suitable Habitats for Wide Number of Species (Plants and Animals).
- □ Lowest Point (Lake Albert); at 621m and, part of the Albertine Rift Valley.
- ☐ Highest point (Margherita of Rwenzori Mountains); at 5,110m.



Natural Ecological Systems

- □Over Five Vegetation (Ecological) Zones of Africa converge on or are part of Uganda;
- □ This is Far much higher Compared to the Scenario of other countries on the African Continent.
- ☐ The Converging Zones characterise what is <u>unique</u> to them, namely;
 - the Ecological Processes, and
 - Life Forms, including Human
- ☐ Thus making Uganda Relatively very Diverse; Ecologically and Ethnically.



Vegetation or Bio-Geographical Zone Convergence, Coupled with Altitudinal Variation Effect; Accounts for

- ☐ Enhanced Ecological and Climatic Effect, leading to the country's Unusual Natural and Cultural Endowment
- ☐ Unique and Rich Ecological Mosaic, and High Occurrence of Rare, Endemic (not found else where) and Restricted (limited to particular habitat) Species (Fauna and Flora).



Some of the Unique Country Attributes

- ☐ The Source of the River Nile ; as known by History and Science
- □Permanent Snow fields on Equator; Rwenzori Mountains.
- ☐ Home to Lake Bunyonyi; Nature Lovers Delight, and reported as 2nd deepest Crater Lake in the World
- ☐ Home to a big part of the highly scenic Lake Victoria; with over 84 Islands insider Uganda.
- ☐ Land of Historical Cultural Self Governance; Kingdoms and Chiefdoms (4 Kingdoms Fully Functional, while two are being Negotiated under the Constitution)

Greater Virunga Ecosystem (Part of the Great Western Rift Valley)

- ☐ The Albertine Rift Valley:
- Africa's richest in terms of endemic species) and threatened species.
- 35% of all African biodiversity is found in the Albertine Rift Valley
- □ The Greater Virunga Ecosystem:
- The Greater Virunga Landscape (12,800Km2) is the richest landscape within the Albertine Rift.
- Has one of the most diverse habitats and altitudinal mosaic.
- Incorporates 6 of Uganda's 10 National Parks, 5 Key Wildlife Reserves, 4 Key Forest Reserves



Key Areas of Species Diversity and Richness

- □Very healthy Population of over 5,950 Chimpanzees (2004)
- □ At least 50% of the global population of the Rare and Endangered Mountain Gorillas Gorilla gorilla beringei (at least 350),
- Record of 1,006("56") species of birds (over 10% of worlds total),
- □Over 4,600 plant species.




Wildlife Conservation Areas

(And other Nature Conservation Areas (Forest Reserves and Wetlands))

Over 10% of Uganda's Surface area set aside as formal Wildlife Protected Areas

- □ National Parks 10; Red
- ☐ Wildlife Reserves 14; Light Yellow
- ☐ Community Wildlife Areas 5; Deep Yellow
- Wildlife Sanctuaries ; 12
- Estimated that over 50% of Wildlife still stays on land outside Wildlife Areas; much of which is privately owned and developed.





People; Culture/Tradition and Institutions

(Population: over 27m peoples)

- ☐ Diverse, rich, well developed and vibrant cultures and traditions; with a very remarkable sense hospitality and humility.
- ☐ Historical variety and richness of (i)
 Languages, (ii) Cultures, (iii) Economies
 and remarkable level of (iv) Social
 Organisations.



Churchill's Observations: 1908

- ☐My journey is at an end,
- \Box the tale is told,
- ☐ and the reader who has followed so faithfully
- ☐ and so far has a right to ask what message I bring back.
- ☐ It can be stated in three words.
- □"Concentrate upon Uganda"



(Churchill, Observations 1908 contn.)

- □But it is alive by itself.
- □It is vital;
- □and in my view, in spite of its insects and its diseases,
- □it ought in the course of time to become the most prosperous of all "our Eastern and Central African possessions",
- □ and perhaps the "financial driving wheel of all this part of the World!"



Churchhill Observations, 1908 Cont.2

- ☐My counsel plainly is "Concentrate upon Uganda!"
- Nowhere else in Africa will a little money go so far.
- □Nowhere else will the results be (i) more brilliant, (ii) more substantial or (iii) more rapidly realised.



Churchill Observations, 1908 Cont.3

- □Uganda is from end to end "one Beautiful garden",
- where the staple food of the people grows almost without labor.
- □ Does it not sound like a paradise on earth?
- It is the Pearl of Africa



Conclusion

- ☐ Uganda is indeed a Country Gifted by Nature:
 - □Unusually endowed with Natural and cultural heritage, both renewable and none renewable.
 - ☐ Hospitable and humorous peoples
 - ☐ Mild weather all year around for the whole country



Conclusion (Cont.)

- □ There is need for timely and strategically moderated interventions, in order to achieve meaningful visibility and impact on a highly competitive regional and global market.
- ☐ Tourism is the fastest growing sectors of the national services sector of the economy, which however faces a host of challenges; one of which is developing the Religious and Cultural Tourism.
