



- The governance structures collapsed at National and local level
- Effective management of the national parks stalled.
- Tourists' arrivals ceased.
- Poachers took over the national parks killing wild animals in their thousands, since now the tourism gains were no longer forthcoming
- The government failed to regulate commercial hunting which resulted in the extinction of key wildlife species such as the black and white rhinos. To date, Uganda has no rhinos in the wild, although Rhino reintroduction program is already underway at the Zziwa Rhino Sanctuary.



Tourism infrasture in the National Parks has been rehabilitated with new additions. And it is only when people at local and national level realize tangible benefits from conservation that they will accept it and respect the conservation areas because there will always be competing or alternative landuses.

Tourism revenues which do not entail destruction is the only sure way to realize those tangible benefits and therefore win the support of everybody to conserve nature.






- Roads that have been rehabilitated and are mostly good

- Crafts and cultural centers are being established.












Population trends of some selected species 1996 - 2005
